




Church Built 1926

"And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

Until 1922, there were only about ten or twelve persons at Simpsonville who claimed affiliation with Presbyterian churches in other places. These few would have been pleased to have had a place to worship in Simpsonville, but there seemed to be no leader among them. It remained for the Reverend J. K. Roberts, Superintendent of extension work in the Enoree Presbytery to bring together the Presbyterians. In October 1922, the Simpsonville Presbyterian Church was organized by a commission of Enoree Presbytery, composed of the following ministers: Reverend R. K. Roberts, Reverend R. C. Morrison, Reverend J. M. McCord, Reverend J. G. Walker; and ruling elders: W. M. Stenhouse of the Reedy River Church and A. S. Peden of the Fountain Inn Church.

Reverend J.K. Roberts presided. Reverend R.C. Morrison preached to the small gathering; his text was Matthew 16:18-19.

There were twelve charter members: W.H. Bozeman, Sr., Mrs. W.H. Dillard, Dr. J. W. Dupree, Mrs. R. P. Gaines, A. M. Kilgore, A.S. Kilgore, Mrs. A. S. Kilgore, Mrs. Furman Smith, A.D. Stenhouse, Mrs. A. D. Stenhouse, G. D. Young, Mrs. G. D. Young.

The elected officers W.H. Bozeman, Sr., A. D. Stenhouse, G. D. Young, A. S. Kilgore, A.M. Kilgore, and Dr. J. W. Dupree. The officers were ordained and installed after which the organization was declared to be a duly constituted church. The meeting of the Presbyterian group was held in the Simpsonville High School building for three years after the founding.

One of the great privileges that the young church enjoyed was that of having the Reverend R. C. Morrison, now deceased, serve as supply. He was an able preacher and at that time was pastor of the Fountain Inn Presbyterian Church. The Reverend Mr. Morrison was succeeded by the Reverend D. C. Stogner of Roberdell, North Carolina. In May 1923, he began serving as the first pastor of the church. He is now deceased.



In November 1926, a contract for a brick veneer church building was let and construction immediately began. J. Furman Richardson donated the lot on which the church building was erected. Mr. Reid Jones was the church builder. On May 30, 1927, the new church home was occupied.

Fifteen hundred dollars was contributed by the Enoree Presbytery and the members and their friends raised about two thousand dollars. The remaining two thousand dollars was borrowed. This debt was reduced annually until it was paid in full in 1937.





The furnishings of the new church were received from various sources. The pulpit Bible was presented by Miss Sue Scott. It was formerly the family Bible in her father's home. The piano was furnished by Mr. and Mrs. A.S. Kilgore. The benches were donated by the Clear Springs Baptist Church. The seats were made from native pine, and fastened together by wooden pegs and handmade nails. They anti-date the Civil War.

DR. E. D. PATTON


Served twice as supply pastor. From July 1942 to September 1944. He served again from August 1949 to 1957.

There were several supply pastors from 1962 until 1970. They were: Reverend J. K. Johnston, Webster Curry, Reverend Paul Gresham (deceased), Reverend W. H. Dendy, Reverend W. T. King, Reverend Vernon A. Crawford, Reverend Fred T. Mc Gill, Reverend Eulus Thomas, Gabriel Abdullah of Jacksonville, Florida, Reverend William H. Meyers, Lt. Colonel United States Air Force, (Retired).

In 1967, a Hammond organ was bought with an organ fund, and the difference was to be paid from the church treasury in memory of Mr. A. S. Kilgore.

The first manse was purchased in 1957, and sold in 1959, and a manse next door to the church was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. J. Dewitte Stenhouse in 1959, and is still the present manse. In 1956, an extra lot was bought joining the manse property in the Poinsettia Subdivision.



PRESENT MANSE



Built in 1958, and was paid for upon completion by donations of members and from the church treasury.






